AN OUTSTANDING FINISH FOR AN OUTSTANDING ALUM

Tim Green has been a part of the Gadsden State family since he entered as a student in the late-1970s. Now, it's time to bid farewell to an institution that has been important to him for most of his life. Green has announced he will retire in October after 33 years of service.

"I can honestly say I had a wonderful time as a student and an even better time building a career that exceeded my expectations," said Green, who is the dean of Technical Education and Workforce Development. "I have thoroughly enjoyed life at Gadsden State."

Green earned his Associate in Applied Technology degree in 1977 from Alabama Technical College, now Gadsden State's East Broad Campus. After several years in architectural design, Green began his career at Gadsden State in 1986 fulfilling a dream to commit his talents to educating others. He started as the senior instructor for the Civil Engineering Technology program. In 1989, he was awarded a Bachelor of Technology from Jacksonville State University followed by a Master of Education 10 years

later from Alabama A&M University.

During his 16 years of instruction, he had the largest class in history to graduate 19 students in one semester from the Civil Engineering Technology Program. Green eventually advanced to division chair in 2001 and then associate dean for Technical Programs. In 2005, he was promoted to dean.

"Throughout my time as dean, I have been a proponent of technical careers," he said.

"I have a wholehearted belief in the value of career and technical education. My passion is helping students succeed. The students have been the driving force behind the College's technical education advancements that have directly benefited our students."

As the dean, Green's duties included and were not limited to the following:



- Corrections Education Division (four programs)
- Skills Training Division
- Workforce Development Liaison
- Continuing Education
- Training for Existing Business and Industry/ Alabama Technology Network-Gadsden (TEBIATN-Gadsden)

Starting in an architectural and engineering background, it is no surprise for Green to have a vision for the technical programs and their instructional facilities.

"As division chair. I had to balance advancement

In 2002, he was instrumental in establishing a Skills Training Division to offer intensive non-credit, short-term skills training. This open-entry/open-exit, competency-based training was designed to allow students into the workforce more quickly as well as immediately respond to industry's workforce needs.

Gadsden State's Skills Training Division was the first fully-functioning division in the state. The division has served approximately 3,500 students and has generated \$3.3 million in revenue since inception.

Green also co-authored the Alabama Fatherhood Initiative (AFI-Gadsden), which is a partnership of state and federal agencies and grantees to provide opportunities for unemployed or underemployed non-custodial parents to



obtain dependable employment to meet their child support obligations. The program is administrated through the Skills Training Division and has assisted in collecting \$1.5 million in uncollected child support and has secured \$1.9 million in grant funds used primarily for student scholarships.

Green initiated and supervised improvements at the following facilities on the Ayers Campus: Adult Education Services, Electronic Engineering Technology and Electrical Technology, Welding Technology Lab, Salon and Spa Management, Drafting and Design Technology and Auto Collision Repair.

The Electronic Engineering and Electrical Technology. Welding Technology Lab and the Salon and Spa Management programs required relocation or renovation due to consistent high enrollment. The renovation doubled the instructional space and providing state-of-the-art equipment was essential in maintaining industry standards.

Green worked alongside Michelle Conger, Ayers Campus director, and Don Smith, maintenance, to maximize efficiency for the Adult



Education Services program on the Ayers Campus by moving the academic instructional space into the Cheaha Career Center. He also initiated renovations for the Drafting and Design Technology program on this campus with a newly furnished classroom and a fully equipped computer lab as well as reopen and equip the Auto Collision Repair building to restart instruction.

Green started instructional improvements with renovations at the Bevill Center consolidating the Automotive Manufacturing. Electronic Engineering, Mechanical Design and Civil Engineering Technology programs in one location, which further led to national certifications for each program. The renovations are centrally located at the Alabama Technology

Network – Gadsden facility allowing all GSCC and ATN students to share advanced training equipment.

Green continued initiating improvements at the East Broad Campus for the technical

programs with reconstruction of current buildings and new construction for specific programs by collaborating with community partners and stakeholders.

The renovation of a vacant building resulted in a spa-like facility for Salon and Spa Management. The building was designed to give the students a real-world experience during instruction. The new facility doubled the instructional space and provided space for the Gadsden City High School Cosmetology Program. Both the Ayers and East Broad facilities were furnished with all new equipment including client workstations, pedi-spas, manicure tables and more.

Green was also the project manager for the renovations to the East Broad Administration

building, which included re-engineering and value-engineering to keep within the \$500,000-and-under project classification. To finish the renovations, he utilized the Carpentry, Electrical and



Maintenance departments to complete improvements and minor renovations to the Administrative building.

Green secured equipment funding to establish the first automated orbital welding facility located on a college campus. This ensured that Gadsden State maintained industry demands while providing highly-advanced skills sets for students based on the practices of the Alabama Regional Center for Welding Automation.

He continued development and improvements for the Welding Technology Program by initiating minor renovations to an existing 6,000 square-foot building to establish an additional Welding Technology facility on the East Broad Campus. He utilized \$230,000 of grant money to purchase high-tech welding equipment including welding booths and multiprocessor welders.

Green also initiated the renovation of the old Upholstery Technology building to accommodate the Electrical Technology and Industrial Maintenance programs providing additional instructional space and equipment. In addition, a new wing was constructed to accommodate the Gadsden City High School Electrical program and, to date, provides classroom space for the Auto Collision Repair program.

The renovations continued with Ralls Hall to initially

accommodate the Electronic Engineering Technology program, equipping it will the modern instrumentation equipment and a multi-media classroom and lab. This building now accommodates the Adult Education Division for the East Broad Campus.

One of his community partnerships was with the Anniston Army Depot (ANAD) to construct educational facilities for the Diesel and Machine Tool Technology programs at no cost to Gadsden State. The new construction included academic classroom space for math, English, speech and computer science.

ANAD procured all of the equipment and furnishings estimating the donation at approximately \$500,000.

Green negotiated a \$2.2 million co-op education contract with the Anniston Army Depot to provide Diesel Technology, Industrial Automation, Machine Tool, Electronic Engineering and Welding Technology program instruction. The co-op program contract covered tuition, books and tools for qualifying students.

Most recently, Green was the project manager for the construction and renovation of a high-bay in the Bevill Center to relocate the Precision Machining program. As part of a team, he helped reduce the pre-construction estimates by well over \$100,000. The project

upgrade for the instructional lab area includes a new CAD lab, a 16-station Haas simulators lab and an additive manufacturing lab. This project established an environment much more conducive to learning industry practices for Precision Machining Program.

It is his hard work and drive that earned Green the 2018 Outstanding Alumni Award.

"The Gadsden State Alumni Association was honored to recognize Tim Green with this award." said Heather New. a member of the Alumni Association Board of Directors. "You can see that over the last 30-plus years, Tim has shown outstanding dedication to the students and their professional development. As a lifetime Alumni Association member, he has served his community through the advancement of technical education for the workforce in our surrounding industries."

Green admitted that all the accolades, awards and successes recognized during his tenure at Gadsden State is largely due to teamwork.

"No one person can claim credit for what happens or what does not happen in the Technical Programs and Workforce Development division," Green said. "It takes all of us."

GADSDEN STATE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION PRESENTS ANNUAL AWARDS HONORING FACULTY, STAFF AND ALUMNI

The Gadsden State Community College Alumni Association honored several individuals at the annual Christmas luncheon held in December at the Beck Conference Center. Justin Hayes, president of the association, gave certificates and recognized outstanding academic faculty, technical faculty, support staff and alumni. The honorees also received a personalized brick that will be placed in the courtyard on the Wallace Drive Campus.

William "Sonny" Kirby Jr., a math instructor was chosen for the **Outstanding Academic Faculty Award**. He has been in education for over 45 years with his last 20 years on Gadsden State's math faculty.

Kirby attended Gadsden State in 1967 and 1968 before going to Jacksonville State University, where he earned a degree in math education. He started his career as a teacher and coach at Glencoe High School, a position he kept for 25 years. During his time at Glencoe High, he began serving as an adjunct math instructor for Gadsden State's McClellan Center and was eventually hired full time in 1997.

While at Gadsden State, Kirby served on the Alabama Education Association and Southern Association of Colleges and Schools committees as well as the sponsor for the Math, Science and Engineering Club. He officially retired in 2008 but continues to work as an adjunct math instructor due to his unwavering dedication to students and his profession.

Deborah "Deb" Reynolds was the recipient of the Outstanding **Technical Faculty Award.** She grew up wiring with her dad at Reynolds Electric and knew she wanted to follow in his footsteps. She earned her first degree from Gadsden State in 1993. She continued her training to obtain her Journeyman and Masters License while working part time at Gadsden State from 1993 to 1997. In 1997, Reynolds completed requirements for her bachelor's degree while raising a child as a single parent. That same year, she became a full-time employee at Gadsden State.

Reynolds, an advisor of the National Technical Honor Society, received the NTHS Recognition Award for being an outstanding advisor for 16 years. She has served on the Honors Committee, volunteers for Habitat for Humanity and coordinates the annual coat drive every year collecting over 4,000 coats. She is active in placing students in school-towork programs at Honda and Tier I plants.



The Outstanding Support Staff Award was presented to Kathy Brown, administrative assistant in the Gadsden State Public Relations and Marketing Department. Brown has worked at Gadsden State for 23 years.

Brown attended Gadsden State, graduating Summa Cum Laude with an Associate in Applied Science. She holds a BS in psychology and sociology from JSU. She is a graduate of Leadership Etowah, and she has served on the Gadsden State Presidential Search Committee and SACS Accreditation Review Committee for Gadsden City School System.

She is a member of a number of organizations, including the ACCS Public Relations Association, the National Council for Marketing and Public Relations, the International Association of Administrative Professionals, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. and Reaching a Generation Mentoring Program.

Gadsden State Community College hosted groundbreaking ceremonies for construction projects taking place on three of its campuses. The projects are being funded by a \$25 million bond issue approved by the Alabama Community College System in March 2017.

"We are excited about the new construction and renovation projects, which are aligned with Gadsden State's strategic plan," said Dr. Martha Lavender, president of Gadsden State.

"The projects address the College's infrastructure needs of aging facilities so that our students have a comfortable environment conducive to learning."

There were two groundbreaking ceremonies on July 26, 2018, with the first one being at the Ayers Campus, where an addition to the Cheaha Career Center is being constructed. The second ceremony took place at the East



Broad Campus for the construction of a new science building and the renovations at Allen Hall on the Wallace Drive Campus.

"The addition to the Cheaha Career Center addresses the need for additional general education classes that support our technical and transfer programs," Lavender said. "We are adding eight classrooms, six offices and a 140-seat lecture hall that will double as a tornado shelter."

The new science building will replace the 51-year-old Browder Hall, which is located on the Wallace Drive Campus. Browder Hall has space and technology limitations.

"The new building will have over 57,000-square-feet of classrooms, laboratories, offices, an auditorium and a tornado shelter," she said. "In addition, the science building essentially unifies the Wallace Drive and

East Broad campuses."

Renovations to Allen Hall, the oldest building on the Wallace Drive Campus, include upgrading bathrooms, electrical plumbing and heating/cooling systems. It will serve students in 22 classrooms and labs and two student gathering areas. There will also be 42 offices and three reception areas.

"The renovation also enhances energy efficiencies of Allen Hall," Lavender said.

All three projects should be completed by the end of 2019.

"At Gadsden State, we focus on the 3 l's – instruction, infrastructure and institution," Lavender said. "Our priorities are not only quality educational programming but also continuous improvement. The construction projects are just one way we continue to improve the educational experience for our students."
